The editors' introduction describes the romantic and dramatic circumstances under which the diary is believed to have left the hands of the Adams family and found its way into the possession of young Royall Tyler, later a successful writer and distinguished Vermont judge, but in the 1780s a suitor for the hand of John Adams's daughter Abigail. Among other matters, the newly found diary contains material on John Adams's life as an undergraduate at Harvard, his choice of a career, his law studies and his first case as a practicing lawyer, his ambitions, and his observations on girls. As L. H. Butterfield, editor in chief of the Adams Papers, says of John Adams, "He almost never fails to give even his casual reflections a characteristic turn. He is a great stylist... His wry, amusing, engaging comments, whether on daily life in New England, on literature, science, or government, show an original mind at work."
